- Abuse is a pattern of behaviors and happens within the context of a relationship

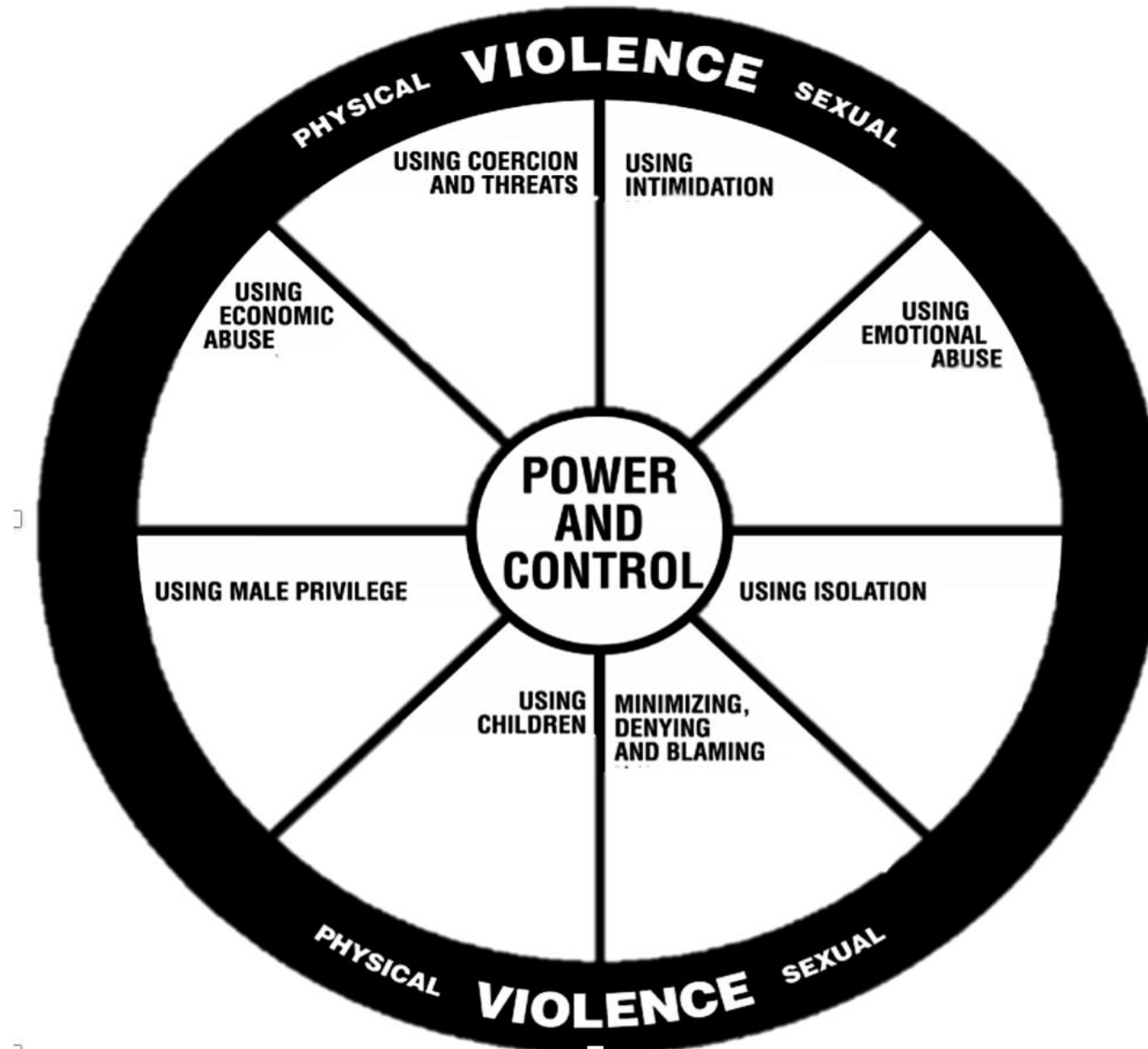


Power and Control Dynamics

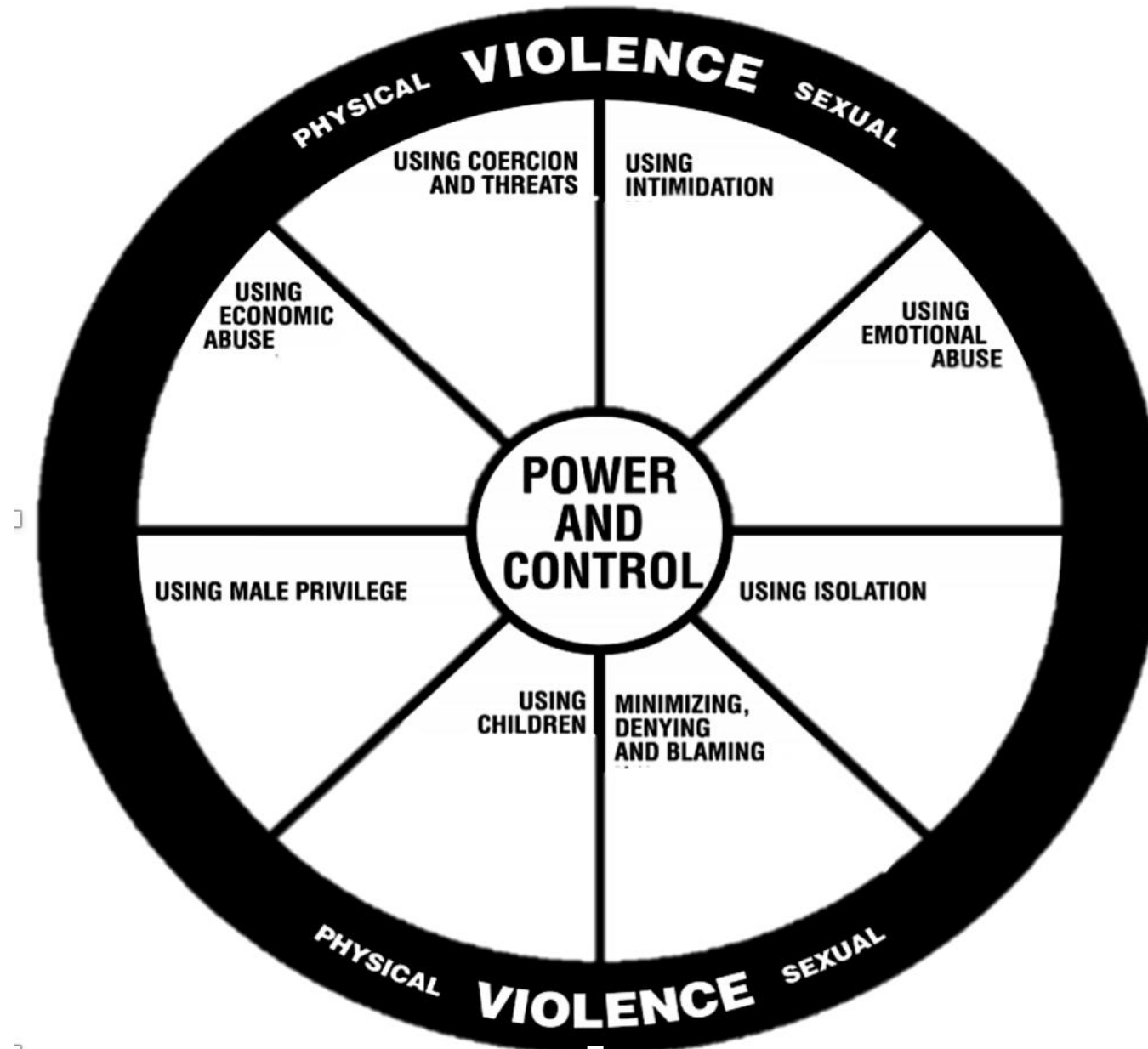

Some of the most common myths about victims:

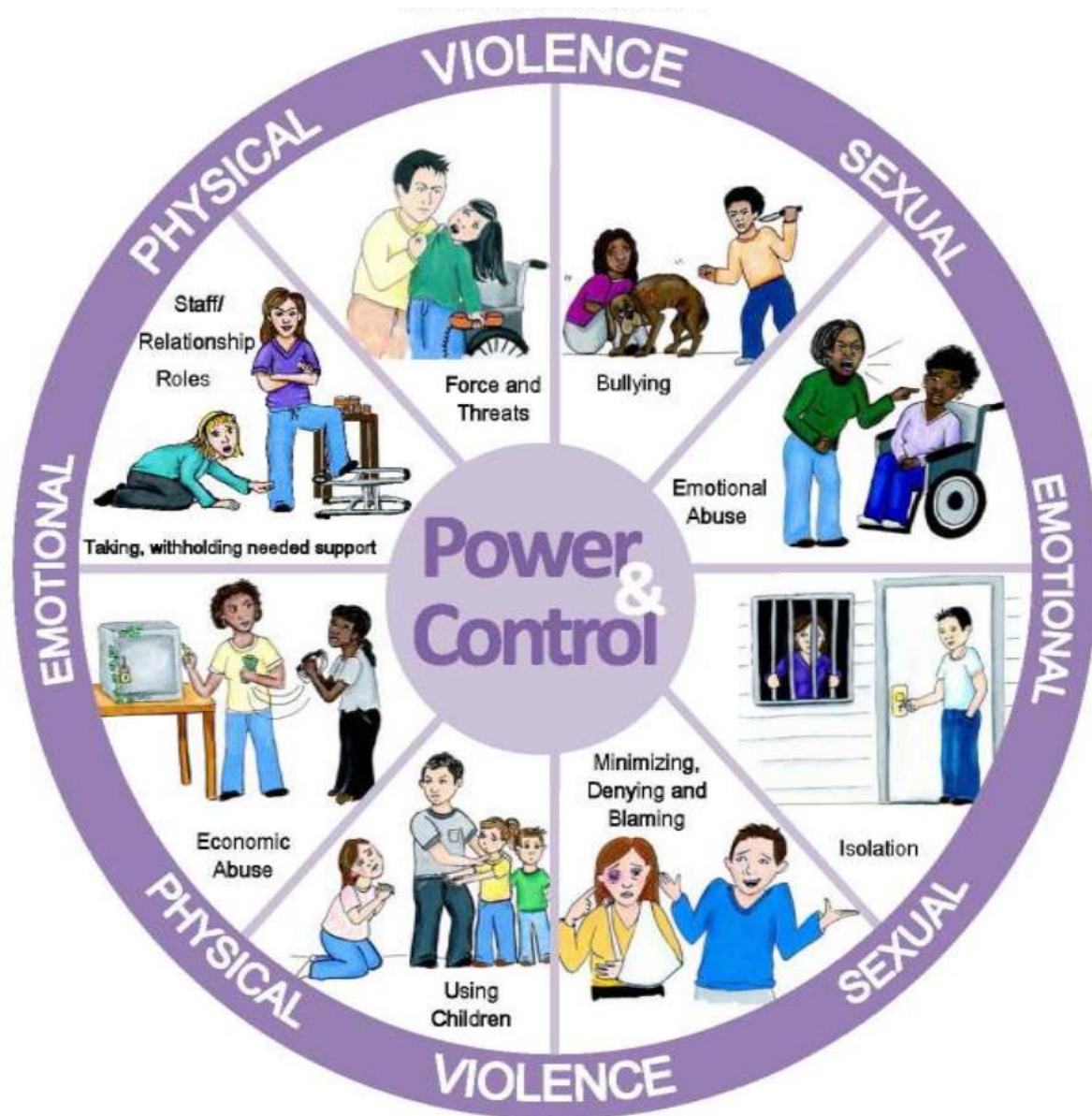
- ✓ They provoked the abuse

- ✓ They are crazy. No one else would put up with them.



Myths and Facts - 2

Some of the most common myths about a PWCH:

- ✓ It's just an anger management problem
- ✓ It's really just alcohol-fueled behavior
- ✓ It was just an isolated incident
- ✓ There really are two-sides to every story . . .
